Placement Exam Specification



KSU School of Foreign Language applies a standardized placement procedure designed to assess incoming students' linguistic competence in alignment with the CEFR (2020) proficiency levels. This process ensures that students are placed in an environment that optimally facilitates their language acquisition. At the beginning of each academic year, all newly enrolled students of Compulsory and Voluntary English Preparatory Programs are required to take the School of Foreign Languages Placement Test before the start of instruction. The placement exam consists of two sections:

- Section 1: A paper-based selected-response (optically scorable) test assessing linguistic competence and oral comprehension, reading skills (90 minutes).
- Section 2: A performance-based writing assessment (40 minutes).

1. The Placement Workflow

Pre-registration: Because the placement exam is compulsory, students are not required to pre-register. The Measurement and Assessment Unit (MAU) handles administration, scoring and evaluation, and the decision-making stages. Notification is handled together by the MAU and the Student Information System (SIS), with results also posted on our website.

2. Cut Off Scores of the Placement Exam

Placement in the A1 Module is a floor decision, not a measured CEFR level. The Placement Exam samples the A2, B1 and B1+ levels only; a total score below 35 indicates that the candidate did not demonstrate control of the A2 material sampled, rather than that A1 competence has been measured. Candidates who do not sit the examination are likewise placed at A1 as a floor decision.

The derivation of these thresholds and the programme for validating them (contrasting-groups validation in the first administration, followed by a modified Angoff panel before the next administration) are set out in the Placement Exam Policy, section “Derivation and Validation of the Cut-Off Scores”.

3. Sectional Level-based Distribution of the Placement Exam

The percentages in this table are proportions of the 70 points of Section 1. The “Level Weight” column in the table below expresses the same levels as proportions of the total 100 points, in which A2 material carries 30 points, B1 material 33 points and B1+ material 37 points across Sections 1 and 2. The two sets of figures use different bases and are not in conflict. Section 2 (Written Production, 30 points) comprises an A2 task of 5 points, a B1 task of 5 points and a B1+ opinion essay of 20 points.

Level Difficulty Parameters

The CEFR (2020) provides no separate B1+ illustrative scale for Reading or for Written Production; the module syllabi therefore use the general B1 scales at B1+ level, as recorded in the syllabus footnote. For these two skills the distinction between a B1 item and a B1+ item is made through the text and task parameters below rather than through a different outcome code. Where a separate B1+ scale does exist — Oral comprehension, General Linguistic Range and Grammatical Accuracy — the outcome code itself carries the distinction, and the parameters below apply in addition.

Item writers record the parameters used for each item on the Item Submission Checklist. The Moderation Committee checks the level claim of every B1+ item against this table.

4. Placement Exam Question Distributions and Types

Note: All Section 1 items are selected-response and optically scorable; no constructed-response format is used in Section 1. Every item carries a skill code from the Placement Exam Policy (L-, R-, LC-, W- codes), recorded in the Item Specification Grid. A2 written production is coded W-A2.3 (sentence-level mechanics), added to the Policy code list. Listening: A2 and B1 tracks are played twice, the B1+ track once, from a single master audio file.
